Nearly Summer Sectional

The start of June not only brings in more of the already hot weather but offers a great opportunity to compete with friends at the *Nearly Summer Sectional*, June 6-8, at the Arabia Shriners. Karen Nussbaum and Gary Kerr are working to provide a great sectional including free bagels (and toppings) on Sunday morning. They are accepting contributions to help defray the expense of this special treat. (Toasters will be provided.) Please note that this will be the last in-person unit sectional until October. As I mentioned in the May issue, we were unable to secure a location for our traditional August tournament so it was rescheduled as a Unit 174 STaC.

Fall October Sectional

Speaking of our *Fall October Sectional*, it will again host an I/N Regional in addition to the regular Fall Sectional events. This is another great opportunity for our Intermediate/Newcomer players to pick up more of those elusive gold points. This year we will not be going to Galveston but will again be at the Arabia Shriners. The flyer for this tournament will be out at the June Sectional. Brigitte Sandifer is the chair of the tournament and Judi Whaling is working with her as co-chair.

Barbara Phillips Lone Star Regional

There is an update regarding the **Barbara Phillips Lone Star Regional (LSR)**, January 19-25. Albuquerque has moved their regional to the prior week, which should bode well for our attendance. The schedule for the regional is on the ACBL website and the flyer will be out shortly.

New Events

This LSR will have two new events on the schedule. The first is the **Soloway Style KO** (knockout). This event has become the go-to event at many top regionals across the ACBL. (Some of you may recall we tried this event a number of times. However, it was not held in Houston as it was designed.) The Soloway Style KOs are bracketed and will have a 2-session Round Robin qualifying event with the top four teams playing two sessions on the second day to determine the first to fourth place. Bracket sizes will be 9-11 teams. What this means to you is that your team is set for two days in case your team places 1-4 since then you will play the next day. If your team does not place 1-4, you can play in a regular Bracketed Round Robin the next day with the same team or a different one. This event will be held three times starting Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Regular Bracketed Round Robins will be held Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday. Masterpoint awards are better for the Soloway and offer a chance to accumulate even more gold by wining just one event.

The second new event in the LSR is the **Bracketed Pair** event. This is a twosession event like the Bracketed Round Robin Teams. Pairs are organized into groups of similar masterpoint levels. This is a new event that has become very popular at regionals where it has been tried. Unit 174 is planning to try it on Thursday and Sunday only. Masterpoints are awarded based on strength of field – so, those A players (in their own bracket) will *boost* the masterpoint awards for every bracket in the event.

On Thursday we will not have a Gold Rush event so our regular Gold Rush players can participate in this event and receive the benefit of the masterpoint award boost. *Please remember everyone will be playing against players at the same masterpoint level like in Bracketed Round Robin Teams.* Hopefully, you will give it a try and we can give our feedback to the ACBL.

Renamed Event

You will notice the name change from Bracketed Swiss Teams to **Bracket Round Robin Teams** – this is exactly the same event, but now it has the proper name. Having a Swiss means after every round you go up against a team with pretty much your same current record in the event, which is not the case when the event is bracketed where you typically play each team. The ACBL would like to promote an event by its proper name to which we are happy to comply.

Sectional Tournament Sites

We are continuing to look for other locations to host our sectional tournaments. Gary Kerr, who is working with Paul Cuneo, and Brigitte Sandifer are developing a list of requirements a facility needs to have for us to begin consideration of that location. Having the right prerequisites for cost, space size, parking, lighting, and restroom facilities are the first step for considering a site. We have received a number of suggestions for sites, but it is difficult for us to visit each one unless we know they have met an initial scrutiny by the person suggesting the location. Therefore, we hope that those sites suggested to the board will have passed this initial scrutiny before we make an in-person visit. Many thanks to all who are assisting the board with this important endeavor.

Hopefully, I will see many of you at the tournament!


Member Profile

For example one Level 3, two Level 2 and one Level 1 players total 8 as would four Level 2 players. Another example would be three Level 2 and one Level 1 players whose team total is 7 and it is OK to be less than 8.



Counting


I recall an interview where Geoff Hampson, a world class bridge player, was asked the biggest advice he could give to newer players. Not surprising to me he answered count, count everything. This means High Card Points (HCP), distribution, trumps. Old habits die hard, so the sooner you can start counting and get into the habit of doing it, the better results you will start to achieve, and the easier it becomes. This may seem daunting at first, but with just a little effort, you can make great improvements in your counting.

Let's start with the easiest, you always count your own hand first, right? So, you know your HCP, plus you can also count dummy's HCP. You already know half of the hands' HCP without doing much work at all. You know there are 40 possible HCP, so you know how many points are in the other two hands, you just don't know how they are distributed.

The bidding or non-bidding can potentially help you to get an idea about some of the other HCP and/or distribution. Even if this seems difficult, just start counting the trump suit. Suppose you are declaring a spade contract, and you have AKxxx opposite Axxx in partner's hand. The best way to count this trump suit is to know that you have eight spades (Five in your hand and three in partner's). That means the opponents have five spades between their two hands. So, you really only need to keep track of the five spade cards in the opponents' hands. You play the A and everyone follows, that's two of the five spades. You play the A and everyone follows, that makes four of the five spades. Now you know there is only one outstanding trump left AND you know they divided 3-2, which can help in counting the distribution.

Once you have conquered counting the trump suit, pick a suit which you think will be important on the hand you are playing and just keep track of that suit. Suppose you're in the same hand and have pulled two rounds of trumps and now you want to establish dummy's diamond suit. Let's say the diamonds are AKxxx in dummy and Axx in your hand. That means you have seven diamonds between your hand and dummy, so the opponents have six diamonds between them. All you need to do is keep track of six diamond cards. If you play the AK and both opponents follow, that's four of the six. If you ruff the next time and they both follow again, they were 3-3 and there are no more diamonds out. If one of them shows out on the third diamond, they were 4-2 and you know the diamonds are not good yet.

So, if counting is new to you, just start with these basic counting tips and build on them once you get more comfortable. I've created two extreme hands just to show you how counting can help you.



Extreme Hand 1:

On this hand there are three passes to south who opens 2NT, partner transfers to spades and south decides to bid 4♠ with great spade support and controls. West leads the ♥AKQ and then switches to the ◆J. South wins the ◆J with the ◆Q and pulls trumps in three rounds. The entire contract depends on a 2-way guess in clubs. Experienced players will always get this one correct. They will finesse east for the ♣Q. Why? Because west is a passed hand and already showed up with ♥AKQ and ◆J. If west also had the ♣Q, that would be 12 HCP and they would have opened the bidding in first chair.

Just a little counting of the opponents HCP led to the right solution on this hand.

Extreme Hand 2:

On this hand south opens 2NT and north bids 6NT. South has 11 tricks after knocking out the A. South has a 2-way guess to find the Q for the 12th trick. If you play all your side winners first, sometimes you get vital information about the distribution. On this hand, south sees that west has five spades, six hearts, one club and therefore one diamond, if declarer just plays winners first. South will therefore play the A and then confidently finesse east for the Q. You simply needed to keep track of the distribution on this hand; HCP were unimportant this time.

I made both hands extreme cases just to make the point of how counting can help.

Sometimes when you play your winners you can know the distribution but not have a 100% correct play. When this happens, it is best to go with the odds. For example, if on this last hand west had 4=5=2=2 and east had 1=2=5=5, you don't have a 100% play in the diamond suit as before, but it is 5-2 odds that east has the $\diamond Q$ (east has 5 diamonds to west's 2 diamonds), so you should finesse east for the $\diamond Q$. Hope these tips help.

Report about the 2025

District 16 GNT Finals

What's a GNT?

Many of you may be wondering, "What's a GNT?" That's the abbreviation of the Grand National Teams event – a grassroots event held every year by the ACBL. There are four flights, recently adjusted: Flight C is non-life master under 750 points. Flight B is under 3000 points. Flight A is under 6000 points. The Championship flight is open to anyone. In the GNT, you get a team of four to six players together (each must live in the district and meet the point qualification above by a specified date which this year was August 6, 2024) and play in the district final held in the spring of each year. The top team in each of the four flights goes on to play in the national final held at the Summer North American Bridge Championship (NABC). In flights B and C, if

there are eight or more teams in the flight at the district final, the district gets to send *two* teams to the NABC – sadly, our Flight B field was only seven teams, so just the top team gets a shot at winning the national title.

If the thought of playing for a national championship isn't enough, each of the 1st place teams gets a stipend to help with travel expenses – this year it is \$2400/team.

Bring Home Lots of Gold & Red

My team won the NABC finals for Flight B in 2019, and I can tell you it was thrilling. I encourage all members of D16 to get a team together for next year's event. At least in Flight B, we need to have eight contenders, so we can send two teams to the NABC. Oh – more sweetener for those in Flight C, the overalls at the District level pay a chunk of gold masterpoints! At the district level, the flight B winning team brought home 33.5 gold this year; the Flight C team earned 10 gold and 10 red masterpoints for winning at the district level. Who knows what success they'll have at the Philadelphia NABC?

Hand Played in the Championship Flight

This hand is one from the recent District 16 GNT final held in Dallas. It was played in the Championship Flight. My team made it to the finals, but were soundly defeated by the winning team, who will go on to play in the NABC this summer.

This is your hand:

South **♦**AQ93 ♥8 ♦Q97542 ♣A4

Opponents are vulnerable, you are not.

West opens 2♦, alerted as being 10-14 HCP with six diamonds and no 4-card major.



Your partner bids 2Ψ , which is doubled without hesitation by East. What is your call?



Remember that 2 is what you might call an 'Intermediate' 2♦, not a Weak 2♦.

Right or wrong, I figured that my partner's 2♥ was in trouble, and I bid to 2NT. This bid was doubled by West, and I ended up playing 2NT doubled.

After the \forall 9 was led, dummy appeared:


What do you think of your chances? How do you analyze the hand?

My thoughts (other than "Darnnnnn") were along these lines:

- My RHO (East) is void in diamonds.
- Hearts are badly offside, and the ♥9 is probably a singleton.



- I think that spades must be 3-3 for me to make this hand. Giving West a singleton heart, if the hand has three spades, then it has six diamonds and exactly three clubs. This might give me a chance to make the hand... Three spades, three clubs, a heart and... a *diamond*! How can I possibly get a diamond when my LHO (West) has the ♦ AKJT sitting over my lowly ♦ Q9? Watch...



(Order of play is approximate, but multiple roads lead to Rome, as it turns out...)

Trick 1: West leads ♥9, ♥10, ♥Q, my ♥8. Trick 2: East leads the \$5, \$A, \$3, \$9. Trick 3: I lead \$3 toward dummy, \$6, \$1, \$K Trick 4: East leads \$2, \$4, \$7, \$K Trick 5: Dummy's ♣Q, ♣6, ♦2, ♣J Trick 6: Dummy's ♥A, ♥2, ♦4, ♦3.

Trick 7: Dummy's \$5, \$2, \$A, \$4

Trick 8: I lead $\blacklozenge Q$, $\blacklozenge 10$, $\blacklozenge 7$, $\blacklozenge 8$ (phew! They're 3-3! So West was 3=1=6=3, and I'm home...).

Trick 9: I lead the fourth Spade, the \blacklozenge 9, as West drops a diamond, dummy and East a heart.

Trick 10: We're down to four cards. Only West and my hand matter. West has the AKJT, and I have the Diamond Q975.

When I play a low diamond, West is stewed. West can win this with the \blacklozenge J or \blacklozenge 10 but will then be endplayed into giving me my \blacklozenge Q, no matter what he does. You can walk through the play by following this link: https://tinyurl.com/28eh6z4c

Note: I was asked why West opened with the ♥9 instead of a diamond. An expert thinks about the hand, not just the first trick. West was hoping that the heart lead would "hit partner" (that is, lead through dummy's strength to partner's strength) and that East would have a diamond to lead through declarer for a multi-trick set. As it turns out on this hand, the declarer can take eight tricks in No Trump with any lead – but if there were a weakness, West's lead of a heart was likely to do the most damage of any lead.

This was a "lucky hand" in that the distribution could have been different – but I used solid reasoning that my partner couldn't have less than he did for the 2♥ bid, especially given East's double. And I took the time to: 1) Count my sure and likely tricks.

2) Work out a lie of the cards that would allow me to take the eight tricks I needed for my contract, given the auction.

In a team game with IMP or victory point scoring, making your contract is your most important objective! On this particular hand we were +490 for making 2NT doubled at our table, not enough to swing the match in our favor, but enough to say we put up a fight.

Special bonus for B and C flight players in District 16 who have read this far: I feel so strongly about how important and fun the GNT events are that If you put together a team for the GNT in 2026, I will (time allowing) give a free 90-minute online coaching session to at least the first two teams in each flight that contact me.
